

Views from the Eiffel Tower



Champ de Mars (Southeast side with long stretch of grass)

- École Militaire (building at the end of the park with a flag) – Military academy built by Louis XV, attended by Napoleon, and retains damage from World War Two.
- Église du Dôme/Les Invalides (golden dome with adjacent grey roofs) – Former private church of Louis XIV and current military museum and burial place of Napoleon.
- Tour Montparnasse (black skyscraper) - Completed in 1973 as part of a proposed financial district, it was so unpopular that it led to a ban on skyscrapers in Paris.
- Panthéon (grey dome to the right of the gold dome) – Commissioned by Louis XV in 1758 in honor of St. Genevieve, now a burial place of famous French citizens.
- Notre Dame Cathedral (square bell towers to the left of the gold dome) – Gothic style church dating back to 1163.

Pont de Bir Hakeim (Southwest side facing an island in the Seine River)

- Pont de Bir Hakeim (nearest bridge to the tower) - Built in honor of the Free French Forces that fought during World War Two.
- Statue of Liberty (on the far tip of the island) – Miniature Statue of Liberty given as a gift to the French from the Americans living in Paris in 1889.

Trocadero (Northwest side with distant skyscrapers)

- Place de Trocadero (plaza above the fountain) – Viewing platform for the Eiffel Tower.
- La Défense (skyscrapers) – French financial district located just outside of the city limits.
- Arc de Triomphe (on right side below a radio tower on the horizon) – French military monument commissioned by Napoleon in 1806 to commemorate the Battle of Austerlitz.

Montmartre (Northeast side facing white church on hill)

- Montmartre (hill with white domed church) – The highest point in Paris, home to the Moulin Rouge, Artists' Square, and Sacré-Cœur Church.
- Grand Palais (glass domed building on the Seine River) – Exhibition hall built for the World's Fair of 1900.
- Pont Alexandre III (bridge with four gold statues) – Completed in 1900, the bridge commemorates the Franco-Russian Alliance of 1892.
- Place de la Concorde (directly above Pont Alexandre III) – Site of the guillotine during the French Revolution in 1793.
- Musée du Louvre (along the river at the end of the green park)– World's most visited museum and former royal palace.

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Classic Walk: Eiffel Tower, Invalides, Pont Alexandre III, Notre Dame, Grand and Petit Palais, etc.

Montmartre: Sacre Coeur, Moulin Rouge, Le Lapin Agile, the vineyards of Montmartre, etc.

Latin Quarter: La Sorbonne, Shakespeare & Co., Pantheon, Place Zero, etc.

French Revolution: Place de la Concorde, Bastille Prison, learn about the lives of Louis XVI and Marie-Antoinette, etc.
